


## MASTERPIECE June 28—July 4

↑ Marchese Vincenzo Giustiniani (1564–1637), a banker who became a noted art collector and patron of Caravaggio, belonged to a family that had been the Genoese rulers of Chios for two centuries before it fell to the Ottomans. Galerie Chenel of Paris has a fine Roman 421/4in-high marble figure of Aphrodite, from the 2nd century AD, which had been in the Giustiniani family until 1981

- ↑ John Whitehead, the Normandy-based Sèvres specialist, will offer this effective blend of East and West. In 1904, Ytiga Noumata of Japan (1873–1954) came to France to learn ceramic sculpture. He was taught at Sèvres by Auguste Rodin and stayed until the First World War. He was back by 1921, and produced a number of models, such as this 16½ in lion, which draws inspiration from Japanese art as well as Rodin's example. He was the first Japanese national to receive the Légion d'Honneur and, back in Japan from the late 1920s, may be credited with the renewal of ceramic sculpture there
- ← Ronald Phillips is honouring the Chippendale 300 celebrations with a remarkable selling show of 35 pieces, running concurrently at Masterpiece and the Bruton Street Gallery. As the price range—from £8,500 to £1.2 million—indicates, the variety and ingenuity of the master is extraordinary; it also shows that much so-called 'brown furniture' is very colourful indeed, such as this elegantly inlaid marquetry serpentine commode for Harewood House in North Yorkshire
